Minutes of the Joint Pastoral Meeting (Sunday 15th January)

Thanks to all those (50 in total) who attended the joint pastoral meeting at St. Aidan's on Sunday. The following is a summary of our discussions with action

points (APs):

Review of Christmas – parishioners from both parishes spoke of how special the Christmas services were. Particular recognition went to the role of the children and their leaders in preparing their contributions to the family Masses. It was also noted that the Reconciliation service had offered the opportunity of a prayerful, reflective start to the Christmas liturgies. AP: St. Aidan's children's contribution should be during the Mass next Christmas – maybe extend it and use costumes etc? Ushers are needed an hour before the Christmas Eve Mass at St. Aidan's.

Winter Gathering – some of the proceeds from the Asda receipts has been used to buy raffle prizes. Organisation of raffle and shared table was discussed.

Provisional Events Dates – 20th April: 'We Can Make a Difference' fundraiser at St. Agnes', 15th July: St. Agnes BBQ, 26th August: St. Aidan's BBQ, 12th October: joint fundraiser at St. Aidan's. The winter gathering will be in January 2013. *AP: Anne Whelan and Lynda Roberts to book clubs*.

Reverence and prayer during Mass – it was agreed that the sanctity of the consecration and the need for silence and prayer during the Eucharistic prayer needs to be emphasised in both parishes. It was also felt that we should once again try to establish a quiet, prayerful atmosphere in the minutes immediately before Mass starts. AP: Fr Anton to speak to the congregations, quiet music to be played immediately before weekend Masses.

Suriname Trip



The 'We Can Make a Difference' group have arrived safely in Suriname and have sent the following update:

Day 1 – Tuesday 24 January 2012 (Liverpool – Amsterdam – Paramaribo)

After an early pick-up in Huyton at 3 a.m. and some slight adjustments to the luggage in JLA to ensure that we all complied with the 23 kg weight limit, our flight left Liverpool on time at 6:10 am and arrived in Amsterdam at 8:10 am local time. Our flight to Paramaribo left Schippol airport at 12:45 pm and after a 9.5 hour journey we arrived safely in Paramaribo to be greeted by the 28 degrees heat! The KLM cabin crew kindly let us take the blankets provided on the flight (we thought of the people in Romania), after Benny had done his usual begging for the project! Father Doris had arranged for us to be collected by bus at the airport and he was waiting for us at the pastoral centre/retreat in the capital where we would be staying. We had a meeting with Father Doris to run through a draft programme for our stay including the villages we would be visiting and the work we could be asked to undertake. There are already some challenges ahead ... one of the projects will be the construction of a toilet in Powakka! Our food in the evening was a typical parish shared table including leftovers from the plane and our own sandwiches we had packed for the journey.

Day 2 – Paramaribo – Wednesday 25 January 2012. We attended a meeting with the bishop at 10 am following which we picked up our vehicles to transport us into the interior and stock up on food provisions for the days ahead. Some of us were bitten by mosquitoes during the previous night so the mosquito nets have proved to be invaluable.

Next three days we will be working in Powaka village. As we are three hours behind and we have got to get this to the parish office in Huyton by midday...we will update you again soon. You can follow us also at:

A Prophet Like Moses

"A prophet like me will the Lord, your God, raise up for you."

Deuteronomy 18:15

When it comes to prophets, you either love them or hate them. There is no lukewarm or neutral response to their incisive message. When a prophet's words challenge unjust systems and liberate folks

who have been oppressed, those set free sing the praises of the prophet. But those whose power, privilege, and status are threatened by the prophet's words and actions will do all they can to silence and even eliminate them. To pray for a prophet like Moses is not only to ask for a prominent prophetic leader but also for each one in the community to be transformed by the prophetic spirit. Moses is famous for having shared a portion of his prophetic spirit with seventy other leaders and for wishing that all in Israel were prophets.

In our own day, it is easy to identify prophets such as Oscar Romero, Martin Luther King, Dorothy Stang, Jean Donovan, Dorothy Kazel, Maura Clarke, Ita ford, Ignacio Ellacuría and many others like them because the stories of how their lives have been cut short for their prophetic witness have come to public attention. There are also everyday prophets, and communities of unsung heroes, who do difficult and agitating work for justice, who never come into the spotlight. They are those who know that trouble is sure to come alongside any triumph of justice. The trouble can even come from within one's own community of faith, not only from outside opponents. One thinks, for example, of the first Australian saint, Mary MacKillop, founder of the Sisters of St. Joseph, canonised in 2010. While she was building communities of sisters who could teach in schools and care for orphans, everyone lauded her. But once she turned a critical eye to an abusive situation in the church itself, she found herself excommunicated.

In the gospel, we see Jesus proclaimed as a prophet, whose fame spreads far and wide. He appears as the promised "prophet like Moses," who teaches with authority, and who has power to cast out unclean spirits. While at first people respond in amazement and wonder, they will quickly turn on him as the gospel progresses, as his challenging message upsets the *status quo*. To ask for such a prophet is not only to ask for a leader who will confront unjust forces external to the faith community but also that we ourselves be confronted by the prophet's searing ability to speak truth. It is to expose ourselves to the invitation to be purified and transformed, to have any 'demons' within us tamed a cast out.

The documents of Vatican II make it clear that it is precisely through engagement with the concerns of the world that Jesus' followers exercise their discipleship. In a sense, all followers of Jesus are called to exercise a prophetic ministry like Moses and Jesus. The readings today invite is not only to pray for prophetic leaders but also to exercise our own prophetic gifts both within and without our faith communities.


