We then had a meeting with some of the villagers to find out what they would like rather than what we think they would like us to buy.

We went on a shopping trip on Monday to look for sports equipment for two of the schools. We requested a shopping list from Powakka before we realised we had another school on the agenda so we doubled up and hope we have bought the right equipment for Redi Dotti.

We visited Brownsweg, which is where Fr Dorus lives, and painted the walls and windows of the church both inside and out. Some of the parishioners and children came in to help us so this also provided a joint venture.

On our return from Powakka we called in at one of the villages where we had attended Mass on our first visit called Koinakondre. It was lovely to see them again and they were so thrilled that we had even remembered them let alone go and visit. This was another incident of pouring rain but at least it's warm and you dry quickly.

Tomorrow, Thursday we will be going to two Ameroindian (Carib and Arawak) villages. We will have to take the ferry as the bridge across the Suriname river is broken. We will visit the school in Redi Doti to give the nursery some toys we have bought. As we have a very limited access to the internet and because of our very busy schedule and the problems on the road due to heavy rains (floods) and police on strike (causing traffic chaos) we will only be able to complete our reports to you on our return on 8 February. We have thought about everybody quite a lot by lighting our candle on a regular basis and prayed for everyone at home to keep you all safe and well. We have looked after one another here and made the group as much of a family as we can.

<u>Suriname Trip</u>

Below is the latest update from the 'We Can Make a Difference' group in Suriname:

This week we have spent two and a half days in Powakka in which time we installed the electrics which, hopefully, will be connected to the equivalent of the national grid in March/April this year. Nobody is holding their breath as to which month this will actually happen as we are working on Suriname time. We sanded and varnished the benches which had been sponsored by some of the parishioners and attached the nameplates which look very smart. The outside work has been hampered from time to time due to the constant, heavy rain. We sanded down the slats on the windows before they were painted in a contrasting colour to the frames. Fr Dorus constructed a canopy at the front entrance of the church which the group then painted. The children also came in on Saturday as they were not at school and gave us a helping hand during which time we tried to convert them to Liverpool supporters but they still prefer Barcelona! We presented the staff at the school with two donated laptops which will help them until they have electricity rather than the use of the generator which only provides a couple of hours power during the evening – there is no electricity during the day. We took a supply of recycled glasses which had been cleaned and graded by Specsavers and used our limited experience from Specsavers to match the right glasses to the recipients following a very basic eve test.

While we were working at this village we noticed how very family oriented these people are as they sit outside their huts of extended family accommodation chatting and sharing their days events. We have had a further meeting at the village as we have since learned that there is a certain protocol to follow which we had not realised. The 'captain' (they used to be called the chief but since there is now more than one village of the same tribe each community has its own leader rather than one leader for the whole tribe) came to have a first meeting with Fr Anton and after this had taken place we then all met together and were told what their plans are for the future and how we may be able to help. They do not want the government to take over all the local decisions and so they want to keep a tight hold on every step of the way.






<u>Celebration of</u> <u>Marriage and Family</u> <u>Life</u>

On Fire With the Good News

"The fever left her and she began to minister to them." (Mark 1:31)

What often makes the difference between experiencing life as endless drudgery and utter misery and being alive with energy and joy is our state of health, be it physical, emotional, or spiritual. Illness and other profound losses colour the whole of our perception. When an illness persists, whether one's own or that of a loved one, one can empathize with Job's feeling of utter weariness. A sense of

helplessness, of not being in control, makes one feel like a slave, who has to answer to another. One longs for relief but has no respite day or night. It seems as if a breath of wind could carry away forever the fragile self; there is no hope of happiness ever again.

From such a pace of pain, we believers, like Job, pour out our hearts to God, knowing that God never sends or wants suffering for anyone. Whether or not the healing we desire comes in the form we want, God is always with us, binding up or wounds and mending our broken heartedness. In the gospels, it is Jesus who embodies this power to repair shattered minds, bodies, and spirits. Regardless of what stands in the way of our being able to receive and share the good news, Jesus binds up or casts out, thus releasing the power within us to experience and pass on God's love.

That is what happens with Simon's mother-in-law. Ablaze with fever, she lacks her usual energy for service to others. In much the same way that Jesus calls her son-in-law to be a disciple, Jesus approaches her, and frees her from all that impedes her from responding to the good news. Just as Simon Peter leaves behind his net so he can "fish for people" so his mother-in-law, holding on to Jesus' hand as the fever leaves her, takes up her own ministry.

The verb 'diekonoun', usually translated as "served" or "waited on", not only refers to serving dinner but also to a wide range of ministries, including ministries of the word and of the table, and service that is apostolic, financial, and administrative. Although this Scripture passage does not tell us in what forms of service she engaged, the early believers remembered not only how Jesus extinguished Simon's mother-in-law's fiery fever but also how from her love ablaze she ministered to and with them.

When Jesus heals people, he does not simply restore them to a former state of well-being. Rather, physical healings are outer signs of deeper transformation of body, mind and spirit. As many people who have had a near-death experience attest, nothing is ever the same afterward. Similarly, Simon's mother-in-law experiences 'resurrection'. The verb 'egeiro', 'lifted up', is the same word used for Jesus' resurrection. A new life has been given her, but not for her only. As with all disciples, it is a transformed life that is to be shared in service.

Jesus' purpose includes not only healing but also preaching. He frees people from whatever binmds them so that they can join him in proclaiming the transforming power of God's love. His preaching encompasses not only a personal release from illness but also the systematic evils from which people must be set free. Paul says that there is not really any choice in the matter. When one has experienced God's gracious healing love, one is obliged to tell it forth. In whatever circumstances we find ourselves, we are preaching God's love. We do this according to our own gifts and calling.

Paul also speaks of how important it is for preachers to adopt the language, images, and symbols of the people to and with whom they are ministering. A person on fire with the good news does not use abstract concepts but tells how divine mercy raises us from the depths of misery, already transforming our sufferings, and leads us to the day of complete joy in God's everlasting embrace.
