Love is born and constantly develops amid lights and shadows

We touch today on a very topical, very sensitive and very painful reality of life in our time – the question of divorce. However, today's Gospel indicates that it was a controversial question in Jesus' time and in his society also.

"The 12 apostles as men were the entitled ones in their society. Jesus helped them to shed their entitlement, their sense of false empowerment. He undercuts every attempt at the domination of one group over another. When his own disciples try to take the high road of power, Jesus takes the low road to teach them his new "way".

Jesus undercuts their idea of the 'in-group' against the 'out-group' (Mark 9: 38-40). He undercuts the domination of one over another (9: 33-35), of adults over children (9:36-37 and 10: 13-16) and of the rich over the poor (10: 17-30).

In today's gospel, he undercuts the domination of men over women. This is not so much a teaching on the indissolubility of the marriage bond as a teaching on the domination of men over women. Jesus refuses it. The divorce laws of the day were mainly laws to protect men by allowing them to keep moving ahead freely and to abandon women without penalty. Jesus refuses to buy into that. He says, "From the beginning of creation God made them male and female." He sees them as brothers and sisters, as equals. "And the two shall be one flesh." They shall not be two but one, preaching a word of equality, not of domination." (Radical Grace: R. Rohr)

In reply to the Pharisees' question about the permissibility of divorce Jesus quotes from the book of Genesis in a passage used in our First Reading today. It expresses in beautiful language the ideal of the perfect marriage: "The man exclaimed [speaking about the companion God had given him]: 'This is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh'... This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife and they become one body."

"We know from our own experience that that not all marriages reflect the ideal that Jesus places before us in today's gospel. Many of us will have relatives whose marriages have not lasted. The gospels are clear that although Jesus presented a certain vision for human relationships, including within marriage, he did not condemn those who fell short of that vision. All of us, married or single, are called to love one another as the Lord has loved us, and we all fail in our response to that call. It is in those moments of weakness and failure that the second part of this morning's gospel has most to say to us, 'anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will not enter it.'

We stand before the Lord with a child-like heart, in our weakness and vulnerability, open and receptive to the great gift of the Lord's love that is given to us unconditionally. It is that gift which empowers us to keep reaching towards the goal, the ideal that Jesus puts before us all."

Synod on the Family

It is perhaps fitting, that today's readings coincide with start of the Synod on the Family.. This year's Synod on the Family, to be held on Oct. 4-25, will be the second and larger of two such gatherings to take place in the course of a year and is the second phase of a three-stage process. Like its 2014 precursor, the focus of the 2015 Synod of Bishops will be the family, this time with the theme: "The vocation and witness of the family in the church and the modern world."

Its deliberations will form the basis of a document written by Pope Francis to be published in the forthcoming Year of Mercy, which begins on December 8. Cardinal Vincent Nichols sees as significant that this document will be published *in the context* of the Year of Mercy and it seems to him quite clear that Pope Francis has established the Year of Mercy as the context into which to place his fruits from the working of the two synods.

Let's pray for the all the members of the synod that they will be open to the Spirit within them and 'with true spiritual discernment, will find concrete solutions to so many difficulties and innumerable challenges that families must confront and will give answers to the many discouragements that surround and suffocate families.'

(Pope Francis in his address at the end of the first synod)

'Perfect families do not exist. This must not discourage us. Quite the opposite. Love is something we learn; love is something we live; love grows as it is "forged" by the concrete situations which each particular family experiences. Love is born and constantly develops amid lights and shadows. Love can flourish in men and women who try not to make conflict the last word, but rather a new opportunity. An opportunity to seek help, an opportunity to question how we need to improve, an opportunity to discover the God who is with us and never abandons us. This is a great legacy that we can give to our children, a very good lesson: we make mistakes, yes; we have problems, yes. But we know that that is not really what counts. We know that mistakes, problems and conflicts are an opportunity to draw closer to others, to draw closer to God.

This evening we have come together to pray, to pray as a family, to make our homes the joyful face of the Church; to meet that God who did not want to come into our world in any other way than through a family; to meet "God with us", the God who is always in our midst.'
